girls giving & growing meets our lieutenant governor

On August 13th, the YWCA Southeastern Massachusetts welcomed Lieutenant Governor Timothy P. Murray to speak with YWCA board members, staff and volunteers about plans for the YWCA's "Under One Roof" capital campaign for the construction of a threelevel addition onto its historic Levi Standish House.

Lieutenant Governor Murray, joined by Senator Mark Montigny, Representative Antonio Cabral and New Bedford City Councillor Jane Gonsalves met with ten of the girls from the YWCA's Girls Giving and Growing program to answer their many questions. Krystal Argueta, age 11 challenged the Lieutenant Governor with questions on women's health care reform and freedom of speech, while Raybryanna Dasher, age 13 asked a local question regarding any possibility of plans for building a teen community center.

Krystal later commented, "I learned a lot about what the Lieutenant Governor

does and more about the political world. I enjoyed watching him answer my challenging questions." "I liked meeting all of them, and I wish they could have stayed longer. We not only got to have the company of the Lieutenant Governor, but we also had the privilege of getting to know him better," said Raybryanna. "And we got his autograph to remember him by," added Krystal. The girls held onto our state and local officials after the meeting to take pictures and request their autographs.

The YWCA's "Under One Roof" capital campaign will allow the YWCA Southeastern Massachusetts to centralize its critical programs of childcare and women's residential housing under one roof in a

new facility that will also allow for expanded programs for teens and teen girls like those from the YWCA's Girls Giving and Growing program.

YWCA youth programs like Girls Giving and Growing have given girls ages 10-14 the opportunities to learn various tools and values in becoming a teen with a well-rounded personality.

Fall has arrived and the YWCA is bustling with activity. In September, the YWCA hosted the New Bedford Chamber of Commerce Business After Hours, as well as two fundraising events: Sizzlin' Salsa Dance Party to benefit leadership development for young women and Under One Roof Reception to benefit our Capital Campaign. I hope that everyone that attended enjoyed them and that you will attend our activities during the 14th Annual Week Without Violence during the week of Oct 18th and our Annual Meeting on November 5th.

October is a busy month that focuses awareness on two very important issues: Domestic Violence and Breast Cancer. The YWCA is a strong advocate for women, girls and their families on both of these issues. 1 in 4 women are affected by domestic violence at some point in their lives. Many children are witnesses to domestic violence. The YWCA partners with the Women's Center, GNB Coast and o the r c o m m u n i t y organizations to put an end to domestic violence. Please join us in this endeavor.

Every year 1 in 8 women are diagnosed with breast cancer. ENCORE^{plus} started in 1994 and continues to be the only breast cancer and education outreach program in the region. For 15 years, the YWCA has provided breast health outreach/education to over 43,000 women and linked over 8,000 women to mammograms and clinical breast exams. Many women served are low-income, uninsured or underinsured and have barriers, such as transportation, translation, and accompaniment to appointments. YWCA staff and peer educators work to eliminate racial and ethnic disparities by providing culturally competent breast health outreach/education in English, Portuguese and Spanish. Waterpals is a rehabilitative exercise and support program for women diagnosed with breast cancer. Women learn from shared information, mutual experience and support.

In 1995 Jan became the QUEST/TRIO Program Retention Coordinator and the TASC Assistant Coordinator. She designed and implemented programs to improve the retention of freshmen students and was responsible for the development and administration of the tutoring program for the New Bedford Campus.

In 2002, Jan became the Director of Disability Services and the Assistant Director for SSS/QUEST for Success Program. Her many responsibilities included developing and managing the Office of Disability Services at the main campus, the New Bedford Campus and the



Attleboro Campus. As Assistant Director of the QUEST Program, she conducted program and division meetings and provided consultations, workshops and in-service training to college staff and faculty.

Jan was recognized by the New Bedford City Council for her achievements and by Mayor Scott Lang with an official proclamation from the City of New Bedford.

Family, friends and colleagues celebrated her retirement with a surprise party held at the Sky Lounge in Fall River on August 13th. Gifts from the party raised \$900, which was donated to the YWCA in Jan's honor.

ywca & women's center collaboration

The Women's Center received \$400,000 in federal grant money to assist services for homeless victims of domestic violence from the Justice Department's Office on Violence Against Women.

The grant will fund assistance for women with financial planning, housing options, childcare, education and career counseling to prevent homelessness.

The YWCA Southeastern MA will work with the Women's Center to place women in homes through the YWCA's single-occupancy housing for women, "A Woman's Place" and "Another Woman's Place."

"For us, this is a really wonderful partnership," said YWCA Executive Director, Gail Fortes. The collaboration will allow women to have permanent housing that will help move them into the direction of a more stable life. "The cost of living is getting to be much more expensive, especially for a single woman. It's very difficult to find a place that is safe, clean and in a place where people care about you. Our goal is not to put a limit on how long women can live there. When they're

feeling comfortable, they can move on to permanent housing," said Gail Fortes.

YWCA received The funding through the City of New Bedford's Office of Housing and Community Development Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program. This funding will support the YWCA in funding financial planning education to women. In collaboration with the Womens' Center and other community programs, "Steps to Stability," an economic advancement program for homeless women or women seeking permanent

housing will be offered at the YWCA. Women that are at high-risk for homelessness are able to transform their lives, through participation in educational programming and free services that focus on new beginnings and reaching selfsufficiency.

"Steps to Stability" is an opportunity for women to enter into a process of selfdiscovery and growth that will enable them to become self-sufficient, productive citizens. For information on referrals, please contact 508-999-3255.
