

Our Mission: YWCA Southeastern Massachusetts is dedicated to eliminating racism, empowering women and promoting peace, justice, freedom and dignity for all.

Our Vision: A healthy community transformed by racial and gender equity, where diversity is embraced and celebrated and all people belong & amp; thrive.

STRATEGIC GOALS:

- 1. Increase investments in the YWCA staff in order to model equitable compensation packages for all staff.
- A. Conducted an equity study on staff compensation packages.
- -Formed an ad hoc committee to review staff compensation and benefits.
- -Conducted an employee compensation and benefits survey.
- -Reviewed all salaries, job descriptions and benefits.
- -Developed a plan to increase staff compensation and benefit packages for 2022-2023.
- B. Increase staff leadership capacity.
- -Developed workplans for all members of the staff, assessed staff professional development needs and provided leadership opportunities for staff.
- 2. Expand anti-racism work to communities outside of Greater New Bedford.

Revenues and support – overall increase of \$433k




Functional Expenses – overall increase of \$136k

Natural Expense Classification Breakout


Employee Compensation and Related Occupancy Other Program Expenses Direct Administrative Expense Depreciation Other

Functional Expense Breakout



The girls worked on these skills through activities such as painting, planting, le dye shirts, friendship bracelets, and team building. They also had the opportunity to get to know one another via a number of trips, rock of mbing, bowling, and beach trips!

ADVOCACY

The YWCA remains at the forefront of addressing issues of racial and gender inequities. We are a member of a regional and national movement working together to strengthen our voice in the local, state and national governments.

Advocacy Coordinator Leimary Llopiz has her feet on the ground, helping lead a number of projects getting the word out about issues facing our community.

She led the Southeastern MA Women Alliance's We Won't go Back March on July 9th and was a featured panelist on the New Bedford Light's series The Chat discussing abortion in Southeastern MA and consequences of the SCOTUS decision.

Each week packages with menstrual hygiene products and other personal hygiene items such as hand sanitizer are distributed to women across the Southcoast through programs such as PACE's Diapers and Things Program, or given directly to women in our residential program.

With efforts led by Leimary and the help of two interns, we have partnered with Mass Voter Table to help provide outreach to encourage people to register to vote and make a plan to vote.





STAND AGAINST RACISM





Heart disease is a community and national issue as it continues to be the number one leading cause of death for women in America. Only 1 in 5 American women believe that heart disease is her greatest health threat.

YWCA Southeastern Massachusetts hosted its 19th Annual Red Dress Event virtually. The event raised funds to support our Community Health Workers, who provide heart-health education and raise awareness about heart disease throughout the Southcoast region, primarily serving women of color, older women and low-income women. This program also assists women with obtaining health screenings necessary for them to identify their own personal risk. Although the event was virtual, attendees were able to enjoy a variety of auction items, raffles, music, an after party, and, of course, the fashion show!

YWCA Southeastern MA serves over 4,000 individuals a year and provides programs and direct services within four concentrations: Adult Services, Health and Wellness, Residential Services, and Youth Services.

Adult Services:

Established in 1992, the **Widowed Persons Program** sponsors the area's only series of support groups for persons who are newly widowed. Needs are met through social activities and personal phone support. Services are available to men and women of all ages.

No words can express how grateful I am that you so kindly and caringly are there to walk this path and guide so gently through the most painful torturous moments of my life. For being a light when there is no light. My sincere heartfelt love.

Economic Empowerment offers financial and digital literacy workshops for residents, veterans, adults, and children and their families.

The Clothesline Project demonstrates the emotions generated by acts of violence against women and children. The project is presented at host sites during Week Without Violence, hosted by YWCAs across the country in October. T-shirts are provided by those willing to express their feelings and emotions, and the shirts are hung for onlookers to reflect upon them.

YWCA Health and Wellness provides outreach, education, translation, support and transportation to women and families in order to improve the health of the community.

Residential Services provides single room occupancy housing for women 18 and older. The program offers safe, secure, and supportive living environments for low-income women.











YWKids School Age Program serves families in need of quality care for their children. YWKids staff strive to acknowledge, respect and design ways to accommodate the uniqueness of each child so that all may reach their fullest potential.

Girls Exclusive is an afterschool & summer program for girls ages 10-14 in Greater New Bedford and Fall River. The goal of this program is to empower girls by cultivating academic and social/emotional learning skills such as teamwork, empathy, responsibility, initiative and problem solving.

Mayor's Youth Council (MYC) was created to be the eyes and ears of city youth in an advisory capacity to the mayor and city government.

The council assists city officials in the development of community projects from a youth's perspective.

Youth/Police Dialogues is a nationally recognized program developed by YW Boston, to provide a safe, structured way for young people and police officers to come together, speak openly and build trust and community.
