Summer Programming

YWCA SEMA continues to provide critical, wraparound assistance including youth and family support; meals to children, families, residents, and individuals in need; as well as supportive services and permanent housing for low-income women. Since mid-March, we have served over 100 children and their families. This type of outreach has continued throughout the duration of the pandemic. Each week, YWCA staff:

- Provide and deliver food, grocery gift cards, and cleaning/disinfecting supplies to seniors in our two adult programs, Health & Wellness and Widowed Persons Program.
- Distribute grocery gift cards, cleaning supplies, and fresh produce (courtesy of Round the Bend Farm) to individuals and families served in our programs. We are currently distributing food supplies to 48 families each week.
- Participate in 2020 Federal Census Outreach, including virtual phone banking, a YWCA hotline for census assistance, and Census outreach at food distribution sites and COVID-19 testing sites in New Bedford.





The YWkids School Age Program and Girls Exclusive Summer Program re-opened at the beginning of July, and both are following closely the guidelines issued by the MA Department of Early Education and Care and MA Department of Public Health. YWkids Summer Program

We are so excited to have had the kids back in our program! Things may look a little different but there was still a lot of fun to be had. We have been traveling around the world this summer, learning about different cultures from various countries such as Australia, Venezuela, and Mexico. The kids have been making crafts, listening to their music, and learning traditional dances. We also incorporated new antiracism books into our Book Nook, and together we've discussed kindness, empathy, and understanding during these difficult times. We had child-friendly discussions about race and racism, while also reading about racial injustice to help children identify and talk about things they may have encountered in their own lives.


Although YWkids was unable to go on field trips this year, the children have been exploring downtown New Bedford and learning new ways to be creative outside.



We have also brought the field trips to them via Zoom. Science Tellers taught us about dragons. Storyteller Len Cabral taught us about the beauty of life. We have new tricks up our sleeves after an exciting magic show. We learned about animals and watched them right on the big screen. Overall, we have had an amazing summer at YWkids!









Girls Exclusive Summer Program

The girls this summer were very artistic and creative! They loved doing activities that involved painting, coloring, designing, or DIY projects! We also explored such topics as self-care, wellness and healthy relationships; racial justice, the movement for Black lives, and the prison industrial complex; nutrition and healthy eating; endangered animals; planting seeds and cooking with fresh produce; internet safety. They built robots using the Lego Mindstorms kits and coded them using iPads to make the robots move. In their last week, the girls LOVED having the

opportunity to watch and discuss Hamilton. They closed camp by making flowers and, on the petals, writing things about themselves they thought were beautiful.

Girls Exclusive is grateful to our community partners who continue to provide programming for adolescent girls. Activities included: "All Aboard the Z" virtual presentations by the Zeiterion; weekly art classes with Alison Wells; outdoor exploration and bike riding with Youth Opportunities Unlimited; free training with Boutique Fitness; Miss New Bedford and Miss New Bedford Outstanding Teen; and Painting At a Splash!










YWCA SEMA Summer 2020 Racial Justice Programming

YWCA has been on the front lines working to empower women and eliminate racism for over 100 years. Following the murder of George Floyd and countless others, the country is facing a reckoning moment when it comes to racial justice. We are now turning YWCA's mission of eliminating racism into a modern-day movement. Our Racial Justice activities provide an actionable way for individuals, organizations, and corporations alike to commit to fighting for racial justice.

- Over 450 individuals attended the five Community Conversations, facilitated by YWCA Executive Director Gail Fortes
- 70 individuals viewed the documentary film "Suppressed: The Fight to Vote" and learned more about voter suppression tactics in this year's Stand Against Racism event, co-hosted by YWCA SEMA and the MA Alliance of YWCAs
- Over 100 individuals are participating in this second Community Reading Circle for Dr. Ibram X. Kendi's "How To Be An Antiracist," facilitated by Andrea Garr-Barnes, co-hosted by YWCA SEMA and the NAACP New Bedford Branch, and sponsored by First Citizens Federal Credit Union



90 individuals participated in the two-part series, "What Is Whiteness?: Exploring White Racial Identity" facilitated by Aimee Davidson and co-hosted by YWCA SEMA and YWCA Rhode Island



165 individuals participated in YWCA SEMA's first 21 Day Racial Equity and Social Justice Challenge. Launched on Juneteenth, this challenge is designed to create dedicated time and space to build more effective social justice habits, particularly those dealing with issues of race, power, privilege, and leadership.



30 individuals participated in this pilot-workshop, facilitated by Jordan Latham and Whitney Mooney, and co-hosted by YWCA SEMA and YWCA Cambridge
